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FROM THE CENTRE OF THE WEB – A Message from Our President

The UCG Board has been working on developing policies for the benefit of the congregation including the very important and much needed Safe Steps which is designed to increase the safety and well-being of vulnerable members of our community. For me, it brings up some interesting dilemmas with respect to welcoming. How do we reconcile our commitment to be a welcoming community with keeping the congregation safe?



I recall June Gilbertson at one of our training sessions for Service Leaders talking about how vital it is for the Service Leaders to create a welcoming and inclusive space for newcomers. One of the ways she directed us to do this was by providing clear directions and a description of the elements of the service that are familiar to us but not obvious to others, such as the chalice lighting, sharing joys and concerns, and creating the arch for the children as they leave. The unspoken message these actions convey is that new people are welcome and we appreciate that they're joining us.

How do we reconcile the cautions provided to us by the insurance and legal systems as we develop policies while continuing to build relationships and invite new members to our community? It is a subject we will continue to explore.

An exercise I discovered recently in a book by Starhawk is the following:

Think of a group that has more structural power than you do. Close your eyes, take a deep breath, and imagine yourself walking into a room full of members of this group. What would they have to do to make you feel included?

How well do we do this at UCG?

I look forward to hearing your thoughts and discussing this further at the Congregational meeting on February 25.

Daring to Live in Gaia For a year and a day, one day every quarter, we will gather to deepen our ability to be fully present and active in the Great Turning, the change from living in industrial growth society to sustainable society. SophiaHeath and Linda Reith will facilitate a day-long workshop building energy and insight to free participants to be all that they can be in this turning.

Our goal is to support people in being a constructive part of the effort to restore our way of living on earth to sustainability. We are influenced by the ideas and practices of Joanna Macy, a long-time activist and educator. We plan to offer five connected workshops at the hinges of the year on the pagan calendar: spring equinox, summer solstice, fall equinox, winter solstice and spring equinox again. The workshops will all follow the arc of opening to gratitude, acknowledging our pain/fear/grief, seeing with new eyes and going forth. In spring we will look at beginnings/seeds of work, in summer the search for fertile ground, in fall the harvest so far and the resistance, in winter that grows in the unconscious/where we're not looking, and in spring reflection and new beginning. This talk is based on the developmental and relational work of Dr. Gordon Neufeld, and presented by Susan Dafeo-Abbey, Parent Consultant and Family Therapist. Susan will address how cultivating the 6 roots of attachment sets the stage for caring, multi-generational communities. She will also describe how adults can harness the power of attachment to make their lives with children easier and more effective. This, in turn, creates a healthier society for people of all ages. It is based on systems theory, spiritual teachings, and deep ecology." This work is completely ordinary and absolutely extraordinary. SOCIAL JUSTICE AND US

A REFUGEE STORY IN THE MAKING

This is a story about a young woman named Soffi Castaneda. She and her two sisters were born in the village of La Plata, Huila County, Colombia. La Plata is a town south of Bogota, Colombia, on the edge of the Andes Mountains. It sits at an elevation of 1050 metres, surrounded by green mountains.

Nine years ago, Soffi's mother fled to the United States with two of her sisters after her political activism brought her into conflict with FARC. In 2008, one of the sisters, Liliana, moved with her husband and their young son to Kitchener, Ontario, where they have been granted permanent residence as refugees.

Meanwhile, Soffi, her husband Julian and her two sons Camilo Andres and Santiago continue to be threatened by FARC as part of their campaign against her mother. They moved in with her father for protection but were forced to leave when he was targeted by a paramilitary

organization. In Nov. 2008, her father was "disappeared". Since then, Soffi and her family have been in hiding.

Liliana contacted the Canadian Unitarian Council in early January, seeking help to bring her sister's family to Canada. Reverend Jessica of the Waterloo Congregation listened to her story and then asked the Board for help. The Board responded with a unanimous "Yes!" Thus began the anti-climactic filling out of form after form. Many members of the congregation stepped forward to offer their assistance and the forms are now almost complete. By the time you read this story, they will have been forwarded on and the great pause will begin as we wait for the machinery of immigration to complete the next chapter of this refugee story.

As a neighbouring congregation to KW, the UCG has asked to be kept in the loop about the unfolding of this story and process, and when the time is right, there will be opportunities to help this family. So, stay tuned for the next chapter in this story! If you are interested in lending a helping hand, there will be many opportunities over the next year. We'll keep you updated in the next newsletter. Let's keep Soffi and her family in our hearts and minds and wish them a safe and smooth transition.
